BECTON DICKINSON DRAFTING COMPETITION: Holdrege High School, in cooperation with Becton Dickinson, will be holding a Drafting/Bridge Building Competition at this years Evening of the Arts on Tuesday, May 5. Prizes for these two competitions are yet to be determined.



Drafting: For the drafting, students must complete a drawing of a specified object, including all dimensions needed to produce each part. The drawings must include 3 views or 2 views where necessary and a 3-D rendering of the part in the right hand corner of the drawing area. Students will use Inventor to draw the object. The drawings will be judged upon accuracy, completeness and ingenuity.



Bridge Building: For the bridge building, students are to build a bridge that spans a distance of 10 inches or more. The bridges will then be tested to see which one can hold the most weight. There will be three general grade level groupings for the contest and an overall prize as well. All students use only the materials that are provided in a kit and teams will consist of no more than 2 persons. Workshops with Mr. Williams, Mr. Shield and some BD engineers will be available for students who wish to attend.

DRIVERS EDUCATION CLASSES: The Nebraska Safety Center will again be offering driver education courses during the summer of 2009. If you are under 18 years of age, passing the course results in a waiver of the written and drive test at the driving examiner office. These courses conform to the rules and regulations of the Nebraska Department of Motor Vehicles and exceed the criteria established for insurance discounts. The first team which competed in the quiz bowl competition consisted of Matt Kreutzer, Ian Vosburg and David Svoboda. They did extremely well and placed 2nd over all out of 32 teams. Jeff Olson and Tiffany Hartwell competed in the written competition and both placed in the top ten individuals out of 50 math students. Also, the students in Pre-Calc and Calculus competed in a real-time, on-line competition last month called World Math Day. It was a fun, fast paced competition where students competed against other people from around the world solving challenging math problems. Overall, the students at Holdrege High School represented math department well. We have some very talented and skilled students. Here is this month's mind puzzle. NOTICE CONCERNING STAFF QUALIFICATIONS: The No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 gives parents the right to get information about the professional qualifications of their child's classroom teachers. Upon request, Holdrege Public Schools will give parents the following information about their child's classroom teachers:

- (1) Whether the teacher has met State qualifications and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction.
- (2) Whether the teacher is teaching under an emergency or provisional teaching certificate.
- (3) The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher. You may also get information about other graduate certification or degrees held by the teacher, and the field of discipline of the certification or degree.

We will also, upon request, tell parents whether their child is being provided services by a paraprofessional and, if so, the qualifications of the paraprofessional. The request for information should be made to the principal in your child's school building. The information will be provided to you in a timely manner. Finally, Holdrege Public Schools will give timely notice to you if your child has been assigned, or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks, by a teacher who does not meet the requirements of the Act.

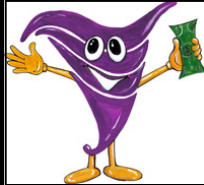

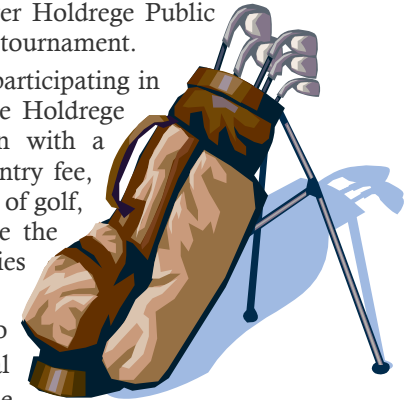
School Foundation Sets Date for Golf Fundraiser
